Kickin' Back in Hyampom

It's summertime, and the livin' is easy. This was especially the case for MDPA's latest fly-in to Hyampom. Six airplanes, thirteen people and two dogs made it for this trip. After a spectacular, clear flight into the Trinity Alps, Dennis and I ran into a little excitement trying to land there for the first time. We made sure we had plenty of altitude to clear the hills, but that same altitude proved way too much for the short canyon approach. The runway looked very tiny underneath the Musketeer. Our first right downwind approach proved way too short, way too fast and unsuccessful. I had a great close up view of the valley (and the ridges) while we gained some height and tried it one more time. The second approach still didn't feel right so, with some helpful advice from Bill, who was hovering and watching the whole thing, we tried a long, slow downwind and made a perfect landing. Nothing like having to do this in front of an audience! Nancy Miller (with passenger/pilot Daniel Meredith) and Bill and Suzie Landstra were in the air circling, waiting patiently for their turn, and they both executed a perfect landing. The Ziegler's Trails Inn van was waiting for us at the airport, and Thora Ziegler whisked pilots and luggage off to the inn, less than a mile from the airport. This is definitely the place to get away from it all. The 6 cabins were quite rustic (none of the luxuries of the Hilton, mind you), but enjoyable nonetheless. The satellite system only carried two channels, but I don't think any of us flew to this incredibly scenic place just to sit back and watch a movie or two. We all checked in, dumped luggage and took the short hike to the river. Michelle Rossi guickly found the old swimming hole, a sunny spot with a slow moving current. While a few people enjoyed the chairs under the shade trees back at the inn, most of us quickly took advantage of a refreshing swim in the South Fork of the Trinity River. We felt like kids without a care in the world. On a side note, one of the big differences between Ziegler's and the Hilton is that they allow you to bring your dog with you, and some folks in our group did just that. I think the dogs loved the fresh air and water just as much as the people did!

General Membership Meeting Minutes

July 21, 2000

Meeting opened at 7:30 p.m. by Bob Lively

We did not have the usual committee reports due to a slavish devotion to the excellent barbecue food in front of the Board members. The following is summarized from the Board meeting two days before.

ACTIVITIES REPORT

The Hyampom trip was a fantastic success. 4 people have expressed curiosity about flying to La Paz. Surprise Valley is a possibility for a September fly out. Bill L. and Bob L. will organize the annual flour bombing and spot landing contest.

MDPA requires pilots flying as PIC in club-sponsored activities to have the appropriate airman's certificate and a current medical, flight review and currency as required for the flight.

PROGRAMS REPORT

We will have the County helicopter for the BBQ.

FACILITIES REPORT

Tie-downs are not first come, first served. There is a waiting list which Bob Lively maintains.

The position of VP Facilities / Clubhouse Manager is open. The Board and a few club members have been doing some of the necessary work but the lack of a central manager is evident. Daniel Meredith has accepted the Board position of Director at Large and has taken responsibility for organizing clean up days until we find a new Facilities Manager.

TREASURER REPORT

We have a deficit compared to last year's financial position. We are investigating whether we will be reimbursed for past payments to the County Sanitation District while we were on the septic tank. The County is taking care of the septic problem.

MEMBERSHIP REPORT

We have currently have 96 members. The new membership flyer is done.

COMMUNICATIONS REPORT

Many thanks to folks who commented positively on the new look of the newsletter. As usual, we welcome submissions of articles and photos for publication. The Web site is getting a facelift but changes won't be noticeable until it is finished. The newsletter is now available on the Web site although it isn't posted until a week or so after the mailings go out. MDPA maintains a number of mailing lists and we'll be working to utilize them better in the future. The two of greatest interest to MDPA members are "mdpamembers" which is a general e-mail list open to everyone for dis-

cussions and announcements of meetings and so forth and "mdpaannounce" which receives only the announcements but not conversational chatter.

COMMITTEES

The Dinner Committee is planning the next several dinners and looking for helpful volunteers. Menus will be published in the newsletter in advance. Last year's crab and steak feed was a hit for the Installation Dinner and Bob L. and Dave C. will work to repeat that success this year. We are considering reinstituting pancake breakfasts and looking at ways to make them valuable for the airport community as a whole.

SAFETY AND MAINTENANCE

No report due to the BBQ festivities.

MONTHLY PROGRAM

Deputy William Duke and Pilot Adrian Strutz of the Contra Costa County Sheriff's Office brought their Bell 407 helicopter for us to see. They explained their duties in helicopter patrols and discussed the capabilities of the chopper for marine patrol, search-and-rescue, short haul and assisting the Sheriff's ground patrols. Traffic patrol is not on their list of duties. The Bell is equipped with a daytime camera and a Forward Looking Infrared (FLIR) camera as well as a 50 million candlepower "NightSun" spotlight.


